This will enable us to have the latest in equipment while making it easier to extend availability of cameras throughout the District. My hope is with more cameras available, more clubs will consider picking up the torch of vision screening in their area so more children and families can be served.

Four of the five cameras we have no longer qualify for service contracts due to their age which means if something goes wrong with them, they are unable to be repaired. Fortunately for us, the five continue to serve us adequately for now. With the additional new cameras we will able to continue providing this much needed service without interuption or worry.

I will be contacting clubs soon to evaluate their need for use of a vision screener. For the time being, we will be following the present schedule that appeared in the July Communique until I can determine the best way to distribute all of the screeners. If any new club would like more information on the process, please don't hesitate to contact me at tallships53@gmail.com. I hope many more clubs will step up and become Visioneers.

I want to remind clubs that do screenings, VLC will reimburse your club for ink, printers and printer cases. (My annual reminder: Keep those printers lying flat while not in use for optimal operation). Please contact Lion Woody Stoddard for the reinbursement procedure. Furthermore I wish to remind clubs it is important to report your screenings monthly to include number of students screened, number of referrals and the names of each school screened. Information of the number of hours served and the number of Lions participating should also be forwarded to your Club secretary so it can be sent to International. Thank you again for what I'm sure will be another great Lions year.

Vermont Lions Charities August 21, 2021 Cabinet meeting report Arlington Lions Park - Arlington

First and foremost, it certainly great to be here at the Lions Park. In early years of my Lions leadership, I have had many visitations with the Arlington Club and will always remember the good times...chicken bbq's with Lion Cyril Hoyt, the many golf outings with Lion Tom Hayes and the wonderful times with PDG Nick & Judy Monte and family and wow, club of the year for D-45. Congratulations.

At our last meeting I spoke to you about southern Vermont families dealing with pediatric cancer and the attempts being made to find these children. I do have some good news to report about CHAD; the Children's Hospital at Dartmouth-Hitchcock. I am now working with a new social worker by the name of Maddie Ritter and since our partnership has been renewed, she has provided us with three new families living in Chelsea, Granville & Danville; not really southern Vermont but much closer. Clearly, with stipends to 23 Vermont families, our (5) partnerships are working. We need your continued support!!!!

On the business side of things, things are beginning to pick up in the area of requests Our income projections for the year will fall short due to COVID 19 and a lack of fundraising. On the flip side, our expenses will exceed expectations due to such donations made to the Vermont Food Bank, Campaign 100 and other incurred expenses in the area of hearing aids and eyeglasses.

My final remarks will center around the position of Secretary for VLC...a position filled for the last 6 plus years by Lion Carmelita Belisle and what a wonderful performance. Lion Carmelita will certainly be missed. We need to fill this position at our annual meeting scheduled for Saturday, October 30, 2021 and the individual selected must satisfy the requirements to seek the position of Vice District Governor(must have served their club as President and served our District as a committee chair). The position requirements are not difficult...4 - 5 cabinet meetings, handling of communications and taking minutes. If anyone is interested, please let me know. I am very happy to inform all that Lion Debra Savery has excepted the position and will need to be elected at the annual meeting.

I am happy to report the following that was decided on at our VLC Board meeting.

1. The Board approved the purchase of 6 new cameras for our vision screening efforts as our current cameras are beginning to feel their age etc. The cost of these cameras are in the neighborhood of \$7500 - \$8000 and the funds will come from our Shared Vision account.

2. Lion Phylis Porio presented to the Board the "Arlinton restoration pool project; estimated cost, \$50.000. The plans call for the Arlington Lions to move forward on their capital improvement campaign to raise \$25000 and VLC would match the raised funds.

3. The Board also contributed \$1000 to the LCIF for the Haiti disaster.

We are very pleased to announce plans for the 2021 District 45 Super Raffle. With our committee of fine Lions we plan to make this event a very successful fund raiser for the District and Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF). Since 2004 we have hosted this great event, each year raising approximately \$10,000 which has allowed us to present approximately 135 Melvin Jones Fellowships to deserving Lions and community members.

We are pleased to make some announcements for the 2021 event.

- FIRST, this year's event will take place at the The Essex in Essex on Saturday, October 30, 2021,
 - in conjunction with the regularly Fall Conference / cabinet meeting of the 2021 2022 year.
 - SECOND, the ticket prices and meals for the event. Tickets will costs \$75 (no meals).
 - \$90 which includes one meal and \$100 which includes 2 meals, maximum 150 meals sold.
- THIRD, 2nd chance insurance policies will still be \$25 but there will be a maximum of only 75 sold
- FOURTH, the GRAND PRIZE will be raised to \$1.750 if 175 tickets are sold, \$2,000 if all 200 tickets are sold.



The Strafford Area Lions Club honored Barbara Murray as the 2021 Citizen of the Year at an outdoor ceremony on Sunday afternoon attended by over 80 well-wishers.

Barbara, who grew up in Strafford in the 40's and 50's later moved back to the same South Strafford home in 1965 when her husband Robert became Principal at the Newton Elementary School. A series of speakers told of her kindness, caring for the children and her love of this community she has called home.

Chrissy Jamieson started with an overview of the many things Barbara has done, largely behind the scenes, including her work with Seniors both in the local organization and in the larger South Royalton group. Michelle Diamond, who was good friends with Barbara's daughter Jody, spoke about how she was almost a second mother and how she later worked with Barbara in the Ladies Aid Society. Earl Silloway, who goes way back (Barbara was a senior when he was a freshman at Thetford Academy), joked about how the Murrays are regular visitors on his porch and often keep him up half the night, although he admitted to going to bed at 7pm.

Newton School teachers who worked with Barbara including David Webb, Diana Leddy, and Joey Hawkins talked about how since Mr. Murray was for many years a teaching principal; Barbara ran the school while he was in class till the afternoon. Diana Leddy spoke about how as a new 24-year-old teacher Barbara took her under her wing and helped her adjust to teaching and living in a small community. Joey Hawkins, with her gift of public speaking and self-depreciation, talked about how Barbara was a vital part of the infrastructure (and as a past Latin teacher broke down exactly what that meant). Joey then went on to say how unflappable Barbara was and gave the example of when while having problems with the copy machine she in her exasperation presented Barbara with a purchase order for a new copy machine. Barbara took this all-in stride and simply said something to the effect that it was unlikely to be approved. Joey then somewhat sheepishly presented Barbara with a music box she had meant to give her 18 years ago for Barbara's retirement party celebrating Barbara's 35 years of working at the school, but had left on a shelf. Barbara's many years as a Board member and volunteer for the Strafford Historical Society were also mentioned. Finally, Barbara's son Michael gave a moving tribute from the family including words from his sister Jody in Arizona who was very pleased to have both her parents to have become Citizens of the Year. (Robert received this honor some 17 years ago for his outstanding leadership at the Newton School for 28 years).

In her thanks after receiving a plaque from the Lions Club, Barbara spoke of her love of her family and her community. She however neglected to say if she would give out her recipe for her famous pop-corn balls, a special treat given out for decades on Halloween, and whose flavor had come up a number of times in the tributes to her.

A beautiful lemon cake with raspberry filling and cream cheese frosting was made Susan Hodges who donated her time and talent making this edible work of art and the Strafford Organic Creamery donated a tub of their vanilla ice cream which was the prefect compliment on a warm afternoon and topped off a wonderful event in a most delightful way.





LCIF quickly responded and approved US\$100,000 in Emergency grant funding to allow Lions in Haiti to respond to urgent needs of the victims.



Slam T1D Whiffleball

The Middlebury Lions Club and friends participated in the 2021 Slam T1D Whiffleball Tournament on August 27th and 28th. Lots of fun!! Lots of sore pride!!! Great camaraderie!! Here are some photos / information:



Type 1 diabetes (T1D) is a lethal, life-altering autoimmune disease that afflicts nearly two million people in the U.S. alone. There currently is no cure and the number of annual diagnoses is on the rise. It is perhaps the only disease in which patients are required to monitor their condition constantly and make their own dosing decisions with a drug that, if improperly administered, can kill them. It is a dangerous and relentless 24/7 grind, and research shows that the vast number of people with T1D are failing to properly and safely manage their disease.

With T1D, the body attacks its own insulin-producing cells in the pancreas. Insulin is a hormone that enables the body to metabolize and use glucase. Elevated glucase levels can be immediately life-threatening in severe cases, but more commonly they can result in a range of serious long-term health complications, including blindness, amputations, heart disease and kidney disease. Low or depressed glucose levels can be immediately life-threatening and require immediate action such as ingesting glucose tablets or the like or administering glucagon via injection. T1D is managed today by a rigorous regimen of monitoring glucose levels – either by pricking one's skin multiple times per day or wearing a subcutaneous continuous glucose monitor – and then administering insulin via injection or an insulin pump. While advancements in technology are working to




automate this process, people with TID and their caregivers must continue to play the role of a pancreas amidst constant concerns of access and affordability of essential medication and equipment.


