January 2022




Well, we did it!

As of December 22, District 45 had screened 10756 students with 1117 referrals. I'd hoped to break 10000 by December 31 and District 45 did not disappoint. You've all done such a great job. This is not to say we are done for the year, however. There are still clubs that have decided to wait for the new year to finish up their screenings and even some clubs planning to begin later this year when and if Covid dies down some so they can get into their local schools. In any event, Vermont Lions have done a spectacular job and I, for one, could not be prouder. If any club wishes to consider screening later, just contact me and I'll be happy to help you get your club organized to do so. Even if you can screen only one school in your area to start, it's enough to get the ball rolling and a project that your club can be most proud of.

I am working with Lion Mark Hanna of the Deerfield Valley Lions who is the District's Public Relations and Lion Information Chair to get the word out about this most important program. I hope to get people everywhere educated in what it is we do with vision screening and the benefits it has for all the children of Vermont. Vision Screening Flyers have been designed and created by our own FVDG Kathy Dorman that are available for distribution by clubs if interested. It's an easy first step toward getting the word out so please let me know if anyone would be interested in the tri-fold flyers. I will have some with me at the January 15th cabinet meeting for anyone who would like to check them out.


As of October 2021, Campaign 100 has raised \$244,900,615 leaving the balance to goal of \$55,099,385.

Marketing Matters



Monthly Tips & Ideas to Enhance Your Lions Club

January 2022 - Boost Success with a Great Press Release

The best marketing is powerful, simple and FREE. And this is where the humble press release really shines! A good news release can increase awareness of your club, attract new members, boost fundraising, and build goodwill in your community. Many Lions clubs are successfully using press releases, but if your club is just getting started, here are some tips. So, what makes a good press release?

1. It has news value.

A good press release always announces something newsworthy and interesting.

2. It gets right to the point.

Good press releases always lead with the Big Five Facts — "Who, What, When, Where, Why". Try to include these in the first two sentences of every release. For example: "The Greenville Lions will host a free diabetes screening at the High School gym on March 3 from 10 am to 3 pm. Because diabetes affects over 34 million Americans, the Greenville Lions offer free screenings twice a year." In two sentences, you've covered "Who, What, When, Where, and Why." The only thing left to do here is to provide a contact email for more info.

3. It's always written in the third person.

Unless you're quoting someone, never use the words "I" or "we" or "us" in your press release. Just write your release like a factual news story – which it is.

4. It includes a GREAT PHOTO.

You can TRIPLE the odds that your release will be published by including a great photo! Try to show your Lions in action, not all lined up stiffly for the camera. Get in close if possible, and focus on moments of warmth, joy, fun, and connection. And always identify the people in your photos, from left to right, with full names. (Plus, titles, if they have them.)

5. It has "heart."

After you've covered the Big Five Facts, add information to make your release more interesting. Are you announcing a Bake Sale? Tempt people by previewing the goodies: apple pie, carrot cake, brownies! If your event is a fundraiser, tell people where the money's going. To build a playground? Help a family whose house burned down? Provide food for neighbors in need?

If you're announcing a membership drive, list all the ways your club serves the community! People love to join other folks who are making a difference.

6. It's easy to read.

Don't make your release long and flowery. A short, compelling story with supporting facts is all you need.

5. It's going to the right media outlet.

Make a list of the regional news sources that people in your community visit, listen to, read or watch, and send your press releases to the proper person at each outlet. (Usually this will be a news editor; find their contact info online.)

Finally, a sustained program of well-written press releases can win your Club the recognition and community support it deserves. I encourage you to use this amazing FREE tool to help your Club grow, thrive, and do great things!

The **Heartland Lions** have continued with their vision screenings and fundraisers, donated to the South Royalton food shelf, operated the Big Six Wheel at the Tunbridge World's Fair, participated in the TREX Recycling Program, and lit their 44th annual Memory Tree.

The **Norwich Lions** have conducted vision screenings, lit their Memory Tree, held their annual Meadow Muffins Contest, conducted a raffle instead their annual Fair, and broke new ground conducting a very successful and innovative on-line auction.

The **Springfield Lions** have conducted vision screenings, held their annual food drive, their 8th annual Fishing Tournament, and their annual Christmas Tree sale.

The **Strafford and Area Lions** conducted their annual food drive for the benefit of three local food shelves, conducted vision screenings and fundraisers, held their annual Strafford Citizen of the Year Ceremony, lit their annual Memory Tree, collected over 500 pairs of used eyeglasses, made and donated baby blankets and newborn and neonatal caps for local maternity units, maintained and operated the Town Pond and the Harrington Hill Rope Tow, participated in the TREX Recycling Program, donated to the LCIF Disaster Relief Fund for tornado relief, and have added six new members.

The **Windsor Lions** fulfilled eyeglasses requests, twice donated to their local food shelf, gave annual Christmas baskets to three nursing homes, awarded their annual scholarship to a graduating high school senior, and provided school aged children lunches during the summer. The **Braintree Brookfield Randolph Area** Branch Club has participated in and is also enlisting the help of other local service organizations to help them with the TREX Recycling Program, conducted a Lions International Peace Poster Contest, assisted the Heartland Lions at the Tunbridge World's Fair, held a food drive to benefit the Randolph Food Shelf, is preparing to do vision screenings, and is collecting used eyeglasses from a local thrift shop and funeral home. Nellie Hart Memorial Award

Through the years it was called Opportunity for Youth, but sometime over the years it got changed to The Nellie, Hart Memorial Award in honor of PDG Nelson 'Nellie' Hart who passed away from cancer. PDG Nellie was a member of the Castleton Lions club. And to this day the award is still going strong and will continue to go strong through the years to come. The following, respectfully submitted by Danielle Coulombe, former member of the Richford Lions Club but one of , if not the only, creator(s) of the award, is a brief history of the award over the years plus a little inspiration story to the start of such:

Every so often we are inspired by those who walk

Among us with extraordinary circumstances that motivate us to do something amazing for humanity and society. Nearly two decades ago I was inspired by a young man who I had the pleasure of doing through school with and graduating. This young gentleman, and let's call him 'AI' for privacy reasons. Well, AI, at seven years old, suffered from a brain tumor requiring part of brain to be removed, chemotherapy and radiation that, while it cured him, took away his childhood and caused a developmental and learning disability he was never born with. I was one of his best friends and I watched as the classmates bullied him, often sticking my neck out to protect him.... He struggled with basic academics but nonetheless he kept trying to improve. He refused to give up even if every aspect of his life was not ideal for his particular needs. He inspired his teachers, the community and me. So during our graduation the teachers used grant money received to form a scholarship and were to choose one senior each year to give it to. They were given only one rule to follow... it must be to a student who has inspired them through their school career. Al was the lone recipient. He used this money, not to go to college, but to study the maple syrup business in hopes of taking over for his grandfather someday. He is now a partner with his Dad In the maple syrup business. He was passionate about tapping trees and boiling sap.

I, being perhaps the youngest Lion in the District and the youngest cabinet member appointed to Opportunity of Youth by Former District Governor Merry Souza (2002/2003) was so inspired by Al's struggle AND SUCCESSFUL graduation that the idea for a scholarship like the one given to him was a perfect way to add to our pledge to our community and to charity. I decided to start a state wide scholarship program with its sole intention to support someone like my friend Al to achieve their dreams. The only two requirements... the money had to be used toward career training, and they had to have an illness or disability that would present a significant challenge to their career aspirations. District governor Souza and my father and mother, Lions Claude and Cathy Coulombe, encourage me to go to a Vermont Lions Charities meeting during a convention. I was 18 years old, going to a bunch of "old and wide timers" and I was so nervous. After getting some understandable questions and "interrogations" and getting the whole, your 18 what can you do attitude, I called on Al's determination and work ethic and I pitched my idea. I left that convention with a guaranteed \$1000 to get it off the ground.

This coming June we will be awarding out 18th high school senior with their scholarship. Over \$18,000 dollars have been provided to deserving youth. We have had the pleasure of meeting a young woman who suffered a debilitation stroke when she was born, and a young man diagnosed at one years old with severe type 1 diabetes. A few kids were like Al and had brain turn or resections, and even one young lady, graduating from my alma matter, with only one functional hand with a desire to go into professional farming despite the physical hindering she faced. Every young adult who submitted an application made our selection process hard. We had plenty of Kleenex availability to dry out years. All of these youngsters remind us of Al's story and they all let us know that passion and dedication can overcome every curve call life throws at us. We only need to support one another and to see the potential in every person.

Windsor Lions Club:

Food Wagon for Sale

The Windsor Lions Club is selling our food wagon and hoping another club in the District is interested in purchasing it. It is a 16' x 8' 2007 Haul trailer converted into a food wagon. The trailer would require a 2" ball hitch. There is a 240 volt/110 electrical panel wired to a 30 amp 4 prong twist lock RV connector to allow connection to either a generator (not included) or a wired outlet. It has a 12 volt battery powered trailer jack (no hand cranking needed) and is silver in color with two Lion logos affixed to it already. It comes with a Deluxe SnoKonette, Dog Hut Hot Dog Steamer, Sam's Club Popcorn Machine, Mega Breeze Cotton Candy Machine, Galanz Microwave, Crockpot, 2 warmers (Star highperformance warmer and a Server warmer), Fimco Industries fresh water storage tank, RV style propane hot water tank, Countertops and cabinets, two bowl sink, two folding chairs, 20 oz. nacho trays (approx. 200), hot dog boats (approx. 200), small boats (approx. 50 – we used for whole dill pickles), Snokone tips and quart bottles (approx. 12 each – to hold the snokone syrup for easy pouring on the snokones), 6 oz. snokone cone shaped serving cups (approx. 4,600), snokone serving cup holder, 13 one gallon plastic containers w/lids (used for mixing and holding extra snokone syrup), 8" x 4" x 18" plastic bags (approx. 700 – used for larger popcorn servings), cotton candy supplies, garbage can w/lid, two large coolers for soda and water, and other miscellaneous utensils, paper products, etc. We are asking \$5,000 or BRO. We can also provide fundraising numbers (net profit for year based on events attended). More pictures available upon request. 





Our Christmas event is delivering Holiday Baskets to the elderly and shut ins. The club buys about \$300.00 worth of food items, and the members buy more food items totaling about \$200.00. The food is brought to one location and packed in "baskets" and are distributed the next day. This year we delivered 24 baskets to our local senior living home, and 24 more to individual out in the community.

Deerfield Valley Lions Club:







Deerfield Valley Lions Serve 600 People in 7 Towns; Directly Give \$21,000 to Those in Need – All In a Few Hours' Time!

For decades, the Deerfield Valley Lions have delivered tons (literally) of food to the food insecure the Saturday before Christmas, and given poinsettias to those in need of cheer. And on Saturday, December 18th, the club – partnering again with the Readsboro Lions, Rotary Club of the Deerfield Valley, and individual volunteers – once again delivered. But in a new way.

The pandemic has changed how the club carries out the operation. No longer gathering together in the old high school gym to pack a thousand (or more) grocery bags, in 2020 the club *mailed* significant funds – in the form of Hannaford gift cards – to recipients. This year – now that we're able to safely get back to in-person deliveries (thanks to the vaccines) – members decided on a hybrid: retaining the grocery gift cards in lieu of grocery bags, and giving them in person, following safety protocols.

We found by polling recipients, with last December's mailing, that the gift cards were actually preferred! (And they can't be used on tobacco or alcohol.) And a new member pointed out that cheerful poinsettias can be harmful to pets, so it was decided that *all* recipients (both food insecure or those just in need of a cheer) get a wonderful gift bag. The new, lighter, deliveries are much easier on deliverers, too, enabling young and old to participate.

The cheer bags are full of treats from local purveyors. Those treats included maple syrup, cheeses, maple coffee, delectable Lymans pickled goods, some healthful fruits as well as candy, etc. And the bonus for those food-insecure is the special envelope with the Hannaford gift card. It's of significant enough value to load up the pantry!

Meeting recipients at their doors is important; it warms the hearts of those receiving the gifts as well as those presenting them. (Witnessing hidden poverty can be eye opening as well.)

Credit goes to a dedicated team of Lions for organizing the event, a hybrid of long-time members as well as many new members – who bring fresh ideas and redoubled energies.

Deliverers received instructions, a physical detailed route map (as well as a QR code that enabled a smart phone to display a GPS map on the driver's dashboard!), the goodie bags, a notecard for recipients, and the Hannaford gift cards in their specially marked, sealed envelopes. Hanging door tags are also a part of it, and they were left on doorknobs of those not home, with instructions on how to contact the Lions to arrange delivery of their valuable gift cards.

Looking at the chart below, one can see the dramatic impact this Lions club makes – with nearly 250 deliveries to almost 600 individuals served during the Holidays! In just a few hours on a Saturday morning, the Deerfield Valley Lions food insecurity efforts directly infused over \$21,000 to those in need in seven area towns and villages.

(The club also involves itself in several other significant areas to address food insecurity, from funding the local Food Pantry to Senior Meals, the local Kids Backpack Lunches and others as well.)

Funds are made possible mainly due to the club's successful Hungry Lion Bike Tour. The bike tour is open to cyclists and now walkers, too. It's always the last Saturday in September – and anyone can participate onsite in Whitingham VT for the foliage and fun, or anywhere, virtually (that week) from their own local, favorite route. More info: www.hungrylionbiketour.com and www.dvvtlions.org.

Said one new non-Lion volunteer, "This was my first year and I was also very impressed with how well organized everything was. It was easy and fun to spread cheer all the way home.



'Just' a farm kid is a job prospect extraordinaire

While attending a job fair last week where Taylor Newspapers manned a booth, I met lots of job seekers.

Some brought resumes. Others just moseyed by, picked up the free stuff on our table and asked a few questions.

But one young woman created a memory for me.

She was a senior in high school, seeking summer employment before starting to a community college in the fall.

"Are you hiring?" she asked.

We said probably not, but we're always looking for good resources, such as part-time photographers and writers.

"We'd be happy to take your resume," I told her.

Then she said something that stuck with me. "I'm afraid my resume wouldn't be too impressive," she said. "I've spent all my life working on my parents' farm. I go to school in the daytime and do chores morning and night."

Whoa.

I told her to go home and create a resume, and write down exactly what she had told me.

As a farm girl, one who has driven a tractor since she was 12, one who has cleaned out barns, scooped grain until her back ached, fed chickens, pigs, cattle and goats — this girl knows the meaning of work.

She knows about dependability and getting jobs done on time. The morning school bus won't wait until a farm kid finishes those chores. They'll be done on time or the young student will miss that all-important ride.

A young person who has put up hay, helped her dad and mother in the farrowing house or candled eggs has something more than words to jot on a resume.

Farm kids don't need to take art appreciation classes in school. They witness picturesque landscapes, sunrises and changes in seasons as they grow up.

They ride horses, drive four-wheelers and neatly stack big bales at the edge of meadows.

They fish in their ponds, learn to handle firearms and shoot deer, rabbits and turkeys.

They work as a family in the garden, raising, harvesting and canning their own vegetables.

Farm kids learn to keep good records on their livestock. When they raise and sell a 4-H calf, they can calculate the profit gained after

deducting feed, vet medicines

and other costs.

They typically know how to stand on their own two feet and give project talks, or give oral reasons for judging a class of lambs or swine.

Many of them earn leadership roles in church, 4-H or FFA, so they can moderate a meeting to perfection using Roberts

They learn early in life the tactics of conservation - how to keep topsoil from washing into Oklahoma; how to plant wind barriers and how to recognize grass-cheating weeds that need sprayed.

Any farm kid can handle a paint brush, spade a garden, pull worms from tomato plants, gather hen eggs, mow grass, groom animals and take one grain of wheat, bite down on it and determine if it's time to start the combine.

And, this girl thinks her resume might be lackluster?

Oh, I don't think so.

Put her to work in a hardware store, newspaper office or grocery store, and she will enter the front door looking for things to do.

It's that way with kids who grow up as farm and ranch kids.

Their resume is written on their foreheads and in their hearts.

They should never apologize.

Never.

VERMONT LIONS HART MEMORIAL AWARD

Lions Clubs International is a global service organization. In 1917 Melvin Jones was a Chicago business leader who told members of his local business club they should reach beyond business issues and address the betterment of their communities and the world. He started what was to become the largest International service organization with over 46,000 local clubs and more than 1.4 million members in over 200 countries around the world.

At the founding of Lions Clubs a main tenet was established of "unselfish service to others".

Over one hundred years later that tenet is expressed in the Lions motto "We Serve". Local

Lions Club programs have grown to include sight & hearing conservation, diabetes awareness, hunger relief, pediatric cancer, environmental issues, and many other programs.

One of the Vermont's most prestigious Lions was Nelson "Nellie" Hart. Lion Nellie Hart served his country proudly in the U.S. Navy aboard the USS Thor (ARC-4) as a cable layer. After his honorable discharge he continued to serve with the U.S. Naval reserve for much of his prime. Lion Nellie had worked in the fuel industry until his retirement, being employed by Whites Fuels of Castleton and later Johnson & Johnson Fuel Company.

Lion Nellie had one of the biggest hearts a community could ever hope to have. He proudly devoted much of his time to the Free and Accepted Masons - Lee Lodge #30 as well as the American Legion - Crippen-Fellows Post 50. He became a member of the Castleton Lions Club and later served as Vice District Governor from 1989-90; District Governor 1990-91; Secretary, Vice President and President of the New England Lions Council; Vice President of Vermont Lions Charities; and as a Director of Lions Twin State Soccer. During his 32 year membership he received high recognition for his service and was awarded the Melvin Jones Fellow award in 1991. In 2004 he was awarded the Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow as well as the International President's Leadership Award.

On March 2, 2005 after a brave battle with cancer, Lion Nellie past away. Lion Nellie Hart was a man of kindness and of great heart. As his daughter Penny Wearing quoted, "Our Dad Nellie Hart was a wonderful man." So it is with great honor that we proudly dedicate the Vermont Lions Disability Award in name of Lion Nelson Hart.

The Vermont Lions Hart Memorial award is presented to a graduating high school senior that has a disability or debilitating illness, either physically or mentally, and is planning to attend college upon graduating high school. The recipient of the award will receive a \$1,000 to further their education and will also be honored with a Vermont Lions Hart Memorial plaque.
